Regional Studies is a central forum in shaping and reflecting the development of advances in studying regions.

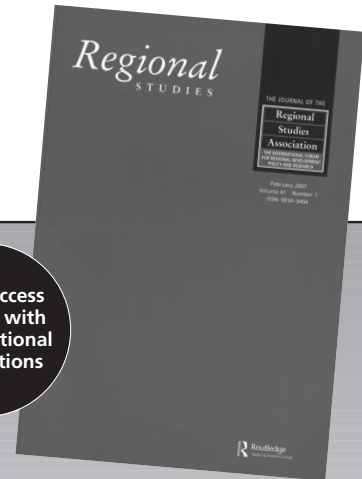
